

# FERNANDA GOMES

## <u>GALLERY 1</u> <u>28.JUL.-14.OCT.2018</u>

Mexico City– July 24, 2018 – Fernanda Gomes' (Rio de Janeiro, 1960) work is developed in close connection to the space in which it unfolds and that she intervenes throughout a significant period of time. For this exhibition, Fernanda has produced works–or as she calls them, "things"–that enter into dialogue with the specific conditions of Museo Jumex's Gallery 1.

Here, ephemeral architectures produce oscillations between different scales. The notions of interior and exterior are subtly transgressed in the exhibition space that, in its turn, spills into the museum's terrace. Certain elements, different versions of a  $90 \times 90$  cm square, unfold on different planes, sometimes empty or cut off. By understanding the exhibition as a singular time-space, the works here assembled are unrepeatable, even if many elements recur in Fernanda's work.

Although her work is presented to the public as "finished", it has the potential to reappear in different configurations. Accidents play an important part in the process of production in which nothing is defined a priori, but enunciated bit by bit. The exhibition space is thus an extension of her studio, a reflection of the vital rhythms involved in the production of these "things".

A marked economy of spatial, energy, and material resources characterizes Fernanda's work. In this formal language, the artist consistently uses wood, white paint, thread, plain textiles, as well as some found objects that are redefined in their unique association to other materials. Fernanda also plays with light as another material that affects the exhibition and uses the potential of the room as a soundbox that registers the movement of the visitors in the space.

Fernanda Gomes has recently showed her work individually at Galeria Luisa Strina, São Paulo (2017); Alison Jacques Gallery, London (2017); Galerie Peter Kilchmann, Zurich (2015); Centre International de l'art et du Paysage, Vassivière, France (2013); Museu da Cidade, Lisboa (2012). She has also participated in collective exhibitions including *35<sup>th</sup> Panorama da Arte Brasileira*, Museu de Arte Moderna, Sao Paulo (2017); *Pliegues, Pares, Twins, Mitades*, The Warehouse, Dallas (2017); *Third Mind. Jiri Kovanda and (Im)possibility of a Collaboration*, National Gallery, Prague (2016); *Accrochage*, Punta della Dogana, Venice (2016); *Une histoire, art, architecture et design, des années 80 à aujourd'hui*, Centre Pompidou, Paris (2014); 13<sup>th</sup> Istanbul Biennial (2013); and 30<sup>th</sup> Sao Paulo Biennial (2012).
